This week we have a story from our Treasurer Sean Roberts

A right royal adventure or two by Sean Roberts

As with all adventure stories, you have highs and lows. And this story is no different.

We were approaching the end of level 4 lockdown and it was announced hunting could resume, but on private land only. There goes my overnighter to Sayers.

So that X & Y are not tapped on the shoulder by every member to take them out on private land, I am not naming them, which I am sure you will understand.

So, back to the level 3 changes that now allowed private land hunting. Member Y called. He had sorted out a hunt for me on a farm. So we met up at a pre-arranged spot maintaining our distance as you did in those times, and headed off to the farm. It was blowing pretty hard up the top, but very sheltered on the leeward side. Unfortunately there was nothing in this gully despite a bloody good look, so we headed back up to the utes. Despite any rumour you may hear, I was stopping to glass on my way back up the hill, not to catch my breath. We drove round to a slip, and moved in hoping to catch something feeding on the slip edge. With nothing there Y was glassing back to where we were, probably 2 km away across a gully, there was a hind out in the open feeding. Bugger. 
