Proposed aerial possum control – Hutt Water Collection Area and Kaitoke Regional Park

Greater Wellington and Wellington Water Ltd. are proposing an aerial operation to target possums in the Hutt Water Collection Area (HWCA) and the Kaitoke Regional Park. Originally, this operation was proposed for winter 2021. However, it has been rescheduled to winter 2022, with the exact timing depending on suitable weather conditions. COLFO

The new Police firearms unit announced by Police Minister Hon Poto Williams is a far cry from the solution originally promised, and fails victims of the Christchurch terror attack, firearm license holders, and all New Zealanders, says COLFO.

The Government had promised in 2020 to create an independent firearms authority in the wake of a mass shooting enabled by Police who incorrectly granted a firearms license to the future terrorist. The announcement by press release last Friday afternoon was instead that administration would now just be arranged under a newly minted Police organizational division.

COLFO spokesperson Hugh Devereux-Mack says the decision let down everyone. "The Government promised to make the public safer, but they've just allowed the Police to rebadge its existing paperwork system.

"The new unit is currently only a name and a newly appointed leader in a press release. We have not been given information about staffing, detailed roles or purpose. There's nothing to give confidence that mistakes, delays and administrative over-reach won't happen again.

"Those issues are continuing, with the licenses of gang members recently only revoked after a long delay."

Devereux-Mack says the new unit is "the exact opposite" of what the Government previously said it would establish: an independent firearms authority, separated from the Police and Government, with a dedicated regulations structure outside of enforcement.

"An independent regulations authority would have had the advantage of purpose-built resources, separation from the distractions and resource-diverting demands of enforcement, and fresh methods to keep guns out of the wrong hands and allowing them to stay in the right ones" said Devereux-Mack.

The Legend of Limpy

Both of my sons have had the opportunity to work on a farm out the back of Eketahuna. The owners allowed myself and my youngest the chance to have a hunt and we did this on a wet Sunday morning recently. The farm has QE2 covenant's over some bush areas, but the deer are where you find them.

It was a pre-dawn start as we wanted to get up there just before it got light enough to see. We hadn't gone 500m down a back country road, when Sam spotted the first deer. I'm blaming the fact that it still was wasn't light enough for my aging eyes, but that is about 10-1 in favour of the younger eyes finding deer in all conditions first. Then he was out of the Ute and over the fence, and starting to put the creep on. I could now see the deer as they started to mill about, and got the binos out to have a closer look. Range was probably about the 500-600m away. He closed the gap to approximately 300m before setting up and loading the rifle. A boom

and they all took off along the face towards a pine block, instead of heading back to the bush at the top of the gully. I counted nine heading off at speed.

Sam came back to the ute as it was going to be quicker to use that, than chasing on foot over open ground. There was one deer which was limping, so we assumed that was the chosen one. Sam crept in again to a range of about 75m and flattened it. He returned to the Ute and said that we could get really close to it using a farm track, so off we went. He then got the Ute stuck so called for back-up while I went to sort the deer out. I took the rifle as we were stuck on one edge of the forestry block the deer had run into. Wind was blowing my scent through the block ahead of me, but I kept a lookout anyway. I soon caught a movement out of the corner of my eye and saw the deer making an escape along the ridgeline above. Range was only 150m or so but I couldn't take the shot for obvious reasons. By the time I had reached the ridge top the buggers had completely disappeared. After another good look around I went and located the downed deer.

It was a yearling hind in good condition. Only one hole in it so the first shot was a clean miss. It was missing the bottom 150-200mm of lower right rear leg. It must have lost the leg as a small fawn, because it had completely healed over and was in the process of growing a pad on the bottom of the stump. The hardiness of deer amaze me!

Talking to another hunting mate of mine, the conversation turned to deer shot that had recovered from previous injuries. He had shot a few that were in that category. Do any of you guys/gals have any photos or stories of deer like that?
