
NZDA Member survey

Aerial possum Control Operations

Aorangis

OSPRI, the Department of Conservation (DOC), Aorangi Recreational Hunters Group and the Aorangi Restoration Trust (ART) are teaming up again for the next phase of Project Aorangi. The 10-year project aims to provide a "triple hit" on pests by reducing the number of possums, stoats and rats over approximately 36,000 hectares of the Aorangi Forest Park and surrounding private farmland. The next stage involves a repeat of the 2014 and 2017 aerial 1080 operation in May–June 2022. We have been told that deer repellent will be used again in 2022. The area of operation is shown on the next page.




Southern Remutakas

EcoFX has been contracted by OSPRI New Zealand to undertake a large-scale aerial 1080 operation in the Southern Remutaka Ranges. The purpose of the operation is to reduce the possum population to low numbers to prevent the spread of bovine tuberculosis (TB). The operation is scheduled to be delivered in May 2022, but may occur as late as June as the programme is weather dependent. There are two phases to the proposed programme.

- Non-toxic prefeed cereal baits will be sown over the treatment blocks at an average rate of 1.0 kg per ha.
- Approximately 7 days later toxic 1080 baits will be sown over the treatment area at an average rate of 2 kg/ha.

Both phases are weather dependant requiring 2-3 fine nights with minimal rainfall after application. EcoFX is obtaining required consents from the relevant agencies to carry out the work. A Personal Best by Liam Dennes

It was the night before our Te Munga hunting trip and my Dad, my brother Callum and I went to bed in excitement as we knew we had an early start in the morning. As we awoke, we realised what today was going to bring, so we packed our stuff and hit the road. It was a cold morning and there was a lot of fog on the road. But we saw some astonishing sunrise views on the tops of the hills. Then we hit the turn off for the dusty windy road into the house. This road was very bumpy in some spots and even muddy which was a little bit surprising as we had had pretty good weather for the whole week.

When we arrived at the house, we unpacked our gear and had a look around. Once we had finished checking the place out, we got ready to go for a hunt. The quad didn't want to start so we jumped on the back of Brad's truck and headed out for the evening to look for deer. We saw quite a few.

When we got back to the house at about 7:30 we were the only ones there. We wondered where the other people, who were hunting with us for the weekend, were. Besides my dad and brother, we also had Brad, Terry, Luke and his son, William, hunting with us. The others all got back pretty late. We made dinner, talked about how our night went, and after that we kids went off to bed.

The next morning when we woke up, had some breakfast, got on our jackets and went out for most of the day. As we drove up the hill on the quads, which finally decided to start working, we pulled off to the side of the road. As we were getting the guns and binos out, we saw a deer not that far away. Dad decided to put a round into him with the .243. After we knew the deer was dead, Callum and Dad went over to gut it. Luke, William and I went around the corner and found this nice little flat spot on the side of the hill. We decided to set up there. After seeing about six or so deer across the gully we made our choice on what one we wanted to take. Luke took his shot first at a fallow doe. We saw a couple more on the same hill just on different clearings. We decided that is was my turn to shoot. But since Dad had left with the range finder, we couldn't get the exact distance. We guessed about 385 yards, then dialled up the scope on Luke's 30-06. I got set up and off the bullet went heading straight for the deer. Dad and Callum came back because they heard the shot. We ranged how far the shot was and it turned out to be 392 yards so we weren't too far off. I got the kill and a personal best!


There was also a buck across the gully. Dad ranged it at 450 yards. Luke got behind the gun, dialled it in and squeezed off the shot. Boom, thump and he fell over. Man it was a long way!

Once we had retrieved the deer, we decided that it was time to head back for lunch. On the way back to the house, we picked up dad's spiker. After everyone had lunch, we thought we might take a rest for a bit and go back out in the evening. So we did. Dad and Luke thought we should go and check out were the trail went that was behind the house. We shot up the trail and found a little slip on the track. We all got of the bikes and had fun throwing rocks into the water next to the road.

In the evening, we found a good spot to stay in. Luke and Dad saw some more deer. Luke had a crack at one and thumped it. When we got over to where the deer was, Dad saw another buck just across the creek from us. It had a split palm so we decided to take it. But by the time we had got Luke's deer done it was time to head back to the house.

The next day we went back to the same spot to get the head off of Dad's buck, it was a bit of a mission trying to get to the deer because it was down a very steep hill covered in bushes, but we made it. We got Dad's deer and then took a quick break before heading back up the massive hill. We went back to the house after retrieving Dad's buck head. By this time, the trip was pretty much over so everyone packed up their gear, tidied up the house, and we all headed home.

I had lots of fun hunting this weekend and was glad that Dad was able to take us. I was really happy to shoot a deer and excited that the shot was a personal best. I can't wait to go hunting again.
