- Best head where a trophy fee is paid (Playle trophy)
- Best pig jaw –undrawn tusks (Harvie Morrow shield)
- Best pig jaw Drawn Tusks (N. Tilsey Sheild)
- Aggregate, two or more species (V.V. Donald shield)
- Best head other species
- Best trophy head 'under 20'
- Tahr / Chamois (Max Cole Barometer)

Photographic categories are:

- Game animals in their wild, outdoor state (W.F. McIntyre Cup)
- Other Wildlife in its wild, outdoor state and not in any form of captivity (V.V. Donald Shield)
- Scenic relative to the sport of hunting (B.W. Newport Cup)
- Other not covered in other categories (K Gear Cup)
- Junior photograph (Amos Cup)

All competitions will be run closely to the Branch Competition rules which have been laminated and displayed in our Parkvale meeting room for the whole competition year. These notes are simply an abbreviation of them.

Key dates this year are:

- Heads, jaws and photos must be taken in the year from 1 September 2023 to 31 August 2024.
- Entry forms and AH&T Trophies (heads) to be dropped off at Parkvale Hall by 7:30 pm Wednesday 4 September 2024.
- Photographs to be emailed to Richard O'Driscoll at wairarapanzda@gmail.com by 7:30 pm Wednesday 4 September 2024.
- Branch Prize-Giving presentation of Awards & Certificates Saturday 19 October 2024.

Extracts from the Rules.

1. Entrants must have been financial members of this branch at the time of shooting the trophy or taking the photograph. Junior members (18 years & under) to be noted on Entry forms please.

- 2. All entries in the Antler-horn-tusk competitions (including the Paid hunting section) must have been taken in unimpeded fair chase. No spotlighting. Paid hunting entries are to be clearly designated on Entry forms.
- 3. Antler-horn-tusk entries must be on a clean, full skull (or jaw). Foul entries will not be accepted. No mounted heads accepted.
- 4. A Disputes panel will be appointed by the Committee.
- 5. A competitor may enter more than one head in each competition.
- 6. Entry forms (both AH&T and photographs) should contain adequate information to illustrate the philosophies within these Competition rules are met.
- 7. Photos taken in N.Z. Not from a Conveyance. No dead animals or birds. All entries will be submitted digitally rather than as prints. Please email high resolution .jpg images to wairarapanzda@gmail.com. Make sure you put "Photo entry" in subject. Images can also be provided on USB to Richard O'Driscoll (021 1411472). You will still need to complete an entry form for each photo entered.
- 8. Judging will be of four categories. The categories must be designated by the entrant and clearly marked on the Entry form and the back of photo. One fully completed entry form (see note 6 above) for each photo. Members may enter up to three photos in each category.
- 9. The categories are:
 - a. Game animals in their wild, outdoor state. Not in any form of captivity.
 - b. Other Wildlife in its wild, outdoor state and not in any form of captivity. The subject matter is to be relevant to hunting, hunting country, and the associated activities of hunters.
 - c. Scenic relative to the sport of hunting. Human activity should be of minor importance.
 - d. Other not covered in other categories. Subject matter is to be relevant to hunting or hunting country. Or the associated activity of hunters.

NOTE: The winning photo of each category will be printed and retained for the Parkvale Hall display board.

Entry form at the end of the newsletter. There must be a separate entry form for each trophy or photo submitted!

FIREARMS REGISTRY REVIEW

The Government is delivering on a commitment made in the National-ACT coalition agreement by commencing a <u>review of the Firearms Registry</u>.

"Cabinet has agreed to the registry review terms of reference and the review is now underway," Associate Minister of Justice, Hon Nicole McKee says.

"It is important that we take stock of the available data and information so that we can establish whether the Registry is effectively and efficiently improving public safety."

The review will be carried out by the Ministry of Justice and will look at data and information, stakeholder insights, and domestic and overseas experiences with firearms record-keeping, to better understand:

- whether the Registry is or will effectively contribute to improving public safety.
- whether the requirements on firearms users are necessary, appropriate, and streamlined.
- the costs versus the benefits of the Registry, and
- what changes, if any, are required.

UPDATES TO RAKIURA/STEWART ISLAND DOC HUNTING BOOKING SYSTEM

DOC has been making progress on updating the entire DOC hunting permit system in all its forms. DOC issue around 55,000 hunting permits are each year. There were 610 party permits issued for Rakiura in 2023. Modernising the IT will make it much easier for people to use, find information, and remove barriers to compliance. For example, the new system will make applying for a hunting permit easy to do on a mobile phone. The team has been looking at how to improve the online experience:

- can applying for a restricted permit be done in real time
- · and can booking a block be made more straightforward.

It is a big job, so we are starting with Rakiura/Stewart Island. Once a protype has been developed, you will see us working with the Game Animal Council, the New Zealand Deerstalkers Association, and small hunter focus groups to make sure the new system is fit-for-purpose.

Recent parties will have seen a change on paperwork from DOC Rakiura.

And you will have seen recent announcement that handheld thermals can be used on conservation land but thermals and night vision on rifles are strictly prohibited on the Island.



BETTER HUNTING WITH THE GAME ANIMAL COUNCIL

Better Hunting is free to access at www.betterhunting.nz and can be used on a laptop, tablet or phone. Courses can also be accessed offline through the free mobile app. The platform saves your progress as you go so you can dip in and out as often as you like. Just create an account and get learning. The Better Hunting platform includes 29 individual training modules and other useful resources for hunters such as a hunt planner, intentions form and multi-map tool. Just visit betterhunting.nz and access them all for free.

Work is nearly complete on a **new pig hunting module**. The course, which has been developed with expert advice from the NZ Pig Hunting Association, covers key information relevant to those either just starting out in pig hunting or wanting to increase their knowledge. Content includes navigating access requirements and landowner permission, personal safety, responsibilities and obligations, animal welfare, food safety and dog training and responsibilities. The new pig hunting course is expected to be launched over the next few weeks and, as with the rest of the Better Hunting programme, will be completely free to access at www.betterhunting.nz.

While Better Hunting is contextualised for hunters, a lot of the training is applicable to every backcountry user, so check out the navigation, compass, survival, first aid, land access or plant identification modules if you haven't already. You may also find the game animal management module interesting, exploring game animal

overabundance from a hunting lens.

Through <u>Better Hunting</u>, we've released a **map to help hunters find useful hunting facilities** and hunting community initiatives. Like a directory it will never be 'complete', so we've released it knowing there are plenty of gaps. To make this useful to the community, we need community input! Please have a look and if there's useful things going on in your region that it would be useful for hunters to know about and access, send in an entry. <u>You can access the map and add an entry here</u>.



WAR ON WAPITI

Adversity and Success in the Orongorongos

Back in January I was seeing what was new on the NZ hunting and shooting forum. There was a post from a guy from Denmark named Magnus wanting advice about hunting in NZ, I read through it and someone had mentioned that he probably won't get his visitors firearms license in such a short time frame, so a new thread was posted by him asking if someone was willing to take him out because of this reason. He was more interested in looking for tahr and chamois in the South Island which wasn't something I could offer. No one else had replied to him so I thought I would at least give him an invite to the Wellington region for some different species. He took me up on the offer and we kept in contact until he was in NZ.

When he made it to the Wairarapa the weather decided to pack in with high winds on the forecast, so I decided that no NZ trip would be complete without seeing some keen dogs swinging off a pig or two which we could do lower down where the wind wouldn't be quite as extreme. We picked an evening that wasn't looking too bad and ended up getting six pigs but all pretty small ones.



Then we got our gear organized to head up onto the Remutaka main range the following day. The weather was

still not great the following day but we made the call knowing that the weather would clear the day after that which would give us three full days of hunting. We walked in that afternoon, it was four hours to the camp we were heading to with a short break half way to load up with plenty of water. Once camp was setup it was too late to get to a point to glass, so we opted for dinner and an early night.



Our first full day was fine and warm so we got our day bags sorted and headed to a lookout to start glassing. It took a fair bit of time looking through the binoculars until we spotted our first deer. He was a long way off so we carried on looking and our patients paid off with five deer walking up the scrubby ridge below us. We assumed they would carry on up the ridge and through a small patch of bush and out the other side, so we quickly closed the distance to 200 yards and waited. They never popped out of the other side of the patch of bush and little did we know at this stage but our trip was going to be plagued with this sort of bad luck.

We eventually had to admit defeat and move on, we wandered back to camp and packed up and moved to our second camp of the trip which was an hour and a half away. The plan was the same for the evening, to get to a lookout and try and pick up an animal in the binoculars. We had a good basin of a mix of slips, grass and broken scrub to look over. Right below me I spotted a bit of scrub moving and swung the bino's on to it. It was a hind and a fawn feeding only a hundred yards from us. As quickly as we saw them they had disappeared again over a small rise. But we weren't worried because surely they would show themselves again.



While we waited another deer popped out just under three hundred yards away feeding up a scrubby face, but again bad luck followed us with the deer moving over the ridge into the next valley. With light fading quickly and high winds predicted for the next day we made a quick decision to cut back up to the main range and come down on top of the hind and fawn. We stalked into position and eventually picked her up again, as I got Magnus set up she was wandering downhill. We struggled to follow her and before we knew it, she was out of sight for good. It was a punishing feeling being so close to getting an animal on three occasions in one day but just falling short three times, but it was still super exciting having the encounters.

Day two was going to be high winds all day so we packed up camp and moved to camp number three. It would give us a bit more shelter and some new country to look at for day three. We did however spot four deer back on the Wairarapa side while we were travelling north along the main range. They were a long way away but fortunately not too far from where we were travelling to. So we done a bit of a scout in the evening to see if they were still there and sure enough they were out grazing in the lee of the wind.


Day three was our last full day of hunting so I was really feeling the pressure now. We had made a plan on how to hunt the deer from scouting the evening before. It was simple, we would head up the main range and drop down straight above where they were in the large open basin. What could go wrong, it was a warm, sunny day and getting into position went like clockwork. Unfortunately there were no animals to be seen except goats. At this point of the trip Magnus hadn't been the first to spot any of the deer we had previously seen except for one which was already dead. I had been giving him a bit of grief about this as well to lighten the mood along the way.

As we sat on the edge of the open basin wondering what our next move should be Magnus got excited and he had spotted two stags sitting in the sun on a narrow ridge down the valley. Was this the end of our unlucky streak, not exactly.




As we got closer they decided to get up and walk back into the bush. We still had to head back that way to get back to camp and after getting bluffed and changing our course I looked up the hill and there was a young stag standing there winding. I put the gun in Magnus' hands and told him to hurry up and shoot the thing. BOOM, the deer went down and rolled a long way down a narrow little creek back towards us.

For me there were equal parts of excitement and relief and for Magnus, well he was just super excited. After some photos and butchery, we headed back to camp, we were really feeling up beat now and kept talking about how everything played out with all the lows and then the success.




We also shot a goat each and I shot a hind on the walk back to camp, our fortunes had definitely changed for the better.

That evening we spent relaxing and getting ready for the walk out the next day, our legs were pretty sore by now. We had an amazing sunset to watch from camp looking down on Wellington city and harbour while reflecting and laughing about our trip.



It makes you realise how lucky we are when you can be in the mountains hunting and be so close to our capital city.
