RANGE & SHOOTING

Gladstone range is available for the use of members. Branch members get six free visits a year. Hours for using the Gladstone range for visitors including Deerstalkers 9:30 am to 1:00 pm on Sunday unless you're accompanied by a Gladstone WPSSC member.

Please keep to these times to avoid disappoint as with new police regulations, Range Officers are required on active ranges even for casual shooting.

There is a Precision Rifle match booked on range 6 on the first Sunday of the month so late morning is recommended for that day unless you would like to join in with them which you are more than welcome to do.



Competition Information It's wild goat hunting season!

Date: 1 August – 26 November. Entries close at midnight on 26 November 2024.

Location: Nationwide - on both public and private land.

All goat tails and goat heads entered must be wild and taken legally, recreationally, and humanely during the competition period. Wild goat heads can only be taken to an approved New Zealand Deerstalker Association (NZDA) entry point.

Entry locations: Find an entry location near you.

Competition rules: <u>Read the competition rules</u>. Competition categories and prizes

We have over \$70,000 worth of prizes donated by the hunting and outdoor sector.

Stewart Island/Rakiura Update

The 4 October update from ZIP outlines their plans of beginning the operation to eradicate cats, rats, possums and hedgehogs from Rakiura. Hunting will be allowed to continue while operations take place. We are aware some people with bookings at South Pegasus for 2025 have been emailed about the plan.

Rakiura Hunter Camp Trust is aware of a ZIP Operational Plan discussing implementation of 1080 use and having minimal exclusion areas and no gaps in bait coverage. The plan says:- "Minimising these gaps means (where possible) sowing over huts (disconnecting water, clearing roofs and immediate surrounds, etc)"

Rakiura Hunter Camp Trust has not been consulted on this issue and the Trust will not condone or support aerial application of 1080 over Hunter Huts.

Some Rakiura residents have begun a Facebook page called "Protect Rakiura" which has differing views and has a link to the Operational plan mentioned above.

Upgrade to Rakiura/Stewart Island hunting block booking system coming soon

DOC is modernising the hunting permits application system, starting with a pilot on the 35 restricted hunting blocks in Rakiura/Stewart Island in late 2024.

The improved system will be rolled out nationally for other restricted hunting blocks throughout 2025 and will also replace the existing open hunting permits system. Note there will be no impact on anyone who already has a permit for 2025.

It will simplify the permit application process for restricted blocks and allow hunters to apply online, much as they can currently do for open hunting permits. For hunters, the application process will be faster, simpler and will allow permits to be stored on their phone or device.

Hunters will need to register in the new system. However, this will be a really simple, once-only activity that will only take a couple of minutes.

Rakiura hunters will still be able to book blocks up to 365 days in advance and can still apply for a permit by calling the Rakiura Visitor Centre or showing up in person.



Firearms safety

We want your feedback - firearms engagement and education framework for New Zealand

Engaging and educating licensed community and public are critical priorities for us. Community outreach and engagement is a growth opportunity: we don't enough have flexible, consistent services that can respond to demands from communities, or where requirements of iwi and Māori are met.

So, we're developing a firearms engagement and education framework for New Zealand that addresses our changing environment, reduces inequality, and leverages firearms community partners to achieve shared outcomes, focusing on safety, licensing, pest control and putting food on the table. We are meeting with a number of groups from the firearms and non-firearms community, to hear their views and ideas around how firearms engagement and education could be developed and we'd like to invite you to share your views as well.

What are your thoughts on how we, and the firearms community, might evolve firearms safety training to be the best in the world?

What are your thoughts on how we, and the firearms community, might better engage with the wider community: in general, in hard to reach/rural places, with school aged – mid 30-year-olds.

Wairarapa Police are getting tough on poachers

Wairarapa Police are stepping up their efforts to target poachers and hope recent convictions encourage rural communities to break the silence.

Police are ramping up patrols on rural roads across the Wairarapa and are stopping all vehicles that they come across, says Acting Sergeant Nick Bunny, Wairarapa Community and Rural Manager.

In the past year, Wairarapa Police have charged a number of people with poaching. Offenders face prosecution in court, having their firearms licence revoked, equipment seized, and firearms destroyed.

"Poaching is a significant issue for our rural communities, and it's a problem that's grossly underreported. Our latest efforts to fight back against it include patrols of rural roads, where we will be stopping vehicles and speaking with the occupants.

"We're not playing around. Poaching has real effects and offenders will face real-world consequences. If we catch you poaching or illegally hunting, your rifles, ammunition and other equipment will be confiscated, and you could be charged with firearms offences."

Message for rural communities: help us help you

To get a sense of the scale of the poaching problem, Police spoke with farmers and rural communities, Acting Sergeant Bunny said.

"From those discussions we've become aware that a lot of unlawful hunting incidents aren't being reported. A lot of people believe Police are too busy or won't show up. In those same conversation, almost every farmer we spoke with had a story of hearing gunshots at night, had seen suspicious activity or noticed suspicious vehicles driving on rural roads at odd times."

Reporting gives Police a valuable insight into where crime and suspicious activity was occurring, Acting Sergeant Bunny said.

"When you report suspicious or illegal activity, it builds a picture for us of where our focus needs to be – we really need the rural community to help us by making those reports as soon as possible."

Suspicious or illegal activity should be reported to 111 if it's happening now. If it's after the fact, make a report online at www.police.govt.nz/use-105 or call 105.

Action by Wairarapa Police has resulted in significant sentences being handed down to convicted poachers.

Earlier this year, a man pleaded guilty to unlawful hunting, entering agricultural land with intent to commit a crime after being caught by Police illegally hunting at an address in Hinakura, South Wairarapa. The firearms and equipment Police seized were destroyed, and the firearms licence holder had his licence revoked.

"Our focus won't stop here. With the start of spring, mating season and new grass growth the Wairarapa Rural Policing Team have recently started night patrols, targeting known poaching and illegal hunting areas," Acting Sergeant Bunny says.

"The Wairarapa is made up of rural farming communities and we need these communities to feel safe and prepared to report poaching or suspicious activity."

Police are happy to talk to local farmers interested in setting up rural watch networks, or installing cameras to identify poachers and vehicles. Anyone interested can email: nicholas.bunny@police.govt.nz



Poison operation Eastern Wairarapa

2024-2025 RPPCP Tinui and Langdale possum control operation – cyanide use

I wish to notify you about the proposed use of cyanide (Feratox) poison for a possum control operation which is being undertaken within our RPPCP Possum Control Operational areas.

This operation is part of Greater Wellington's Regional Possum and Predator Control Programme (RPPCP) and is aimed at protecting our environment from possums, improving the natural biodiversity of the area and reducing threats from bovine tuberculosis to domestic stock.

The total control area covers 22,198 hectares and is located approximately 10 km west of Masterton. Please see the map for the boundary details. If you own or manage a property within this operational area, our staff will contact you to discuss and agree upon control methods before any possum control activity commences on the property. They will also keep you informed of progress as the operation proceeds.


The main methods of control proposed for the area includes the use of **Brodifacoum 50p in bait stations -** Treatment area 22,198 hectares

Encapsulated cyanide (Feratox) pellets in bait-stations or biodegradable blue bait- bags. Cyanide pellets are pea size, dyed green and mixed with prefeed bait - cyanide treatment area consists of five separated RPPCP areas covering a total area of 22,198 hectares.

The use of cyanide baits will commence from 18 November 2024 onwards, and I am expecting the work to be completed June 2025.

Poison warning signs will be displayed at all main access points to the operational area and the following instructions should be adhered to:

- Do not touch toxic baits, bait stations, or possum carcasses
- Supervise children closely
- Keep dogs under strict control and away from carcasses and bait


