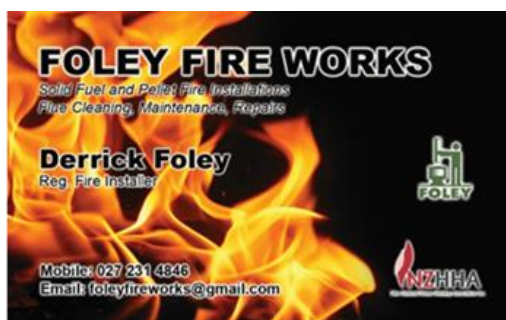

## **NATIONAL GOAT COMPETITION**

### **RESULTS TO BE ANNOUNCED 13TH DECEMBER**

Over 8000 tails collected and entered. We think this is a great result, with around 70% of entrees being first time participants. This is a great indicator that the interest in hunting goats is increasing. Results of the major prizes and top placing branches will be announced on the 13th of December so keep an eye out on social media and your inbox.





A new advertising campaign from 11 November 2024 is designed to remind households with firearms, that when they aren't being used firearms are safest in a safe.

We've launched the campaign to be a catalyst for positive conversations within households with firearms about how they should continue to secure their firearms and ammunition every day.

We want to make it harder for burglars and thieves to get hold of firearms, but also to keep firearms safe from curious young hands or anyone else that shouldn't have access to them.

The reality for most recreational firearms users, even really keen shooters or hunters, is that a lot of the time their firearms are not in use. Others like farmers might use their firearms weekly or daily, but it is equally important that they are locked away in the safe each night. This campaign is just a friendly reminder to households that when you aren't using them, firearms must be locked in your safe.

Keep an eye out for the campaign in the coming months. It's running across radio, print, social and digital channels.

## Northern Remutaka: Proposed Aerial 1080 Programme – Operation Renotification

EcoFX has been contracted by OSPRI New Zealand to undertake a large-scale aerial 1080 operation in the Northern Remutaka Ranges. The purpose of the operation is to reduce the possum population to low numbers to prevent the spread of bovine tuberculosis (TB).

A non-toxic prefeed was undertaken on the 20th May, we were unable to complete the toxic phase due to unfavourable weather conditions. It is now planned to reschedule a second prefeed from mid-November, with the Wainuiomata water catchment area being excluded (see map).

There are two phases of the proposed programme.

- Non-toxic prefeed cereal baits will be sown over the treatment area at an average rate of 1 kg per hectare.
- Approximately 7 days later toxic 1080 baits will be sown over the treatment area at an average rate of 2 kg per hectare.

Both phases are weather dependant requiring 2-3 fine nights with minimal rainfall after application. EcoFX has obtained the required consents from the relevant agencies to carry out the work. As part of public notification, EcoFX will be placing advertisements in local and regional papers circulating in the wider area to inform the public of the operation and the associated risks.

In addition, EcoFX will be erecting signage at all key public access points such as walking and cycle tracks, roadways and public amenity areas.

- DO NOT TOUCH poison bait
- WATCH CHILDREN at all times
- DO NOT EAT animals from the area (this also applies to buffer zones around the treatment area)
- Poison bait or carcasses are DEADLY to DOGS

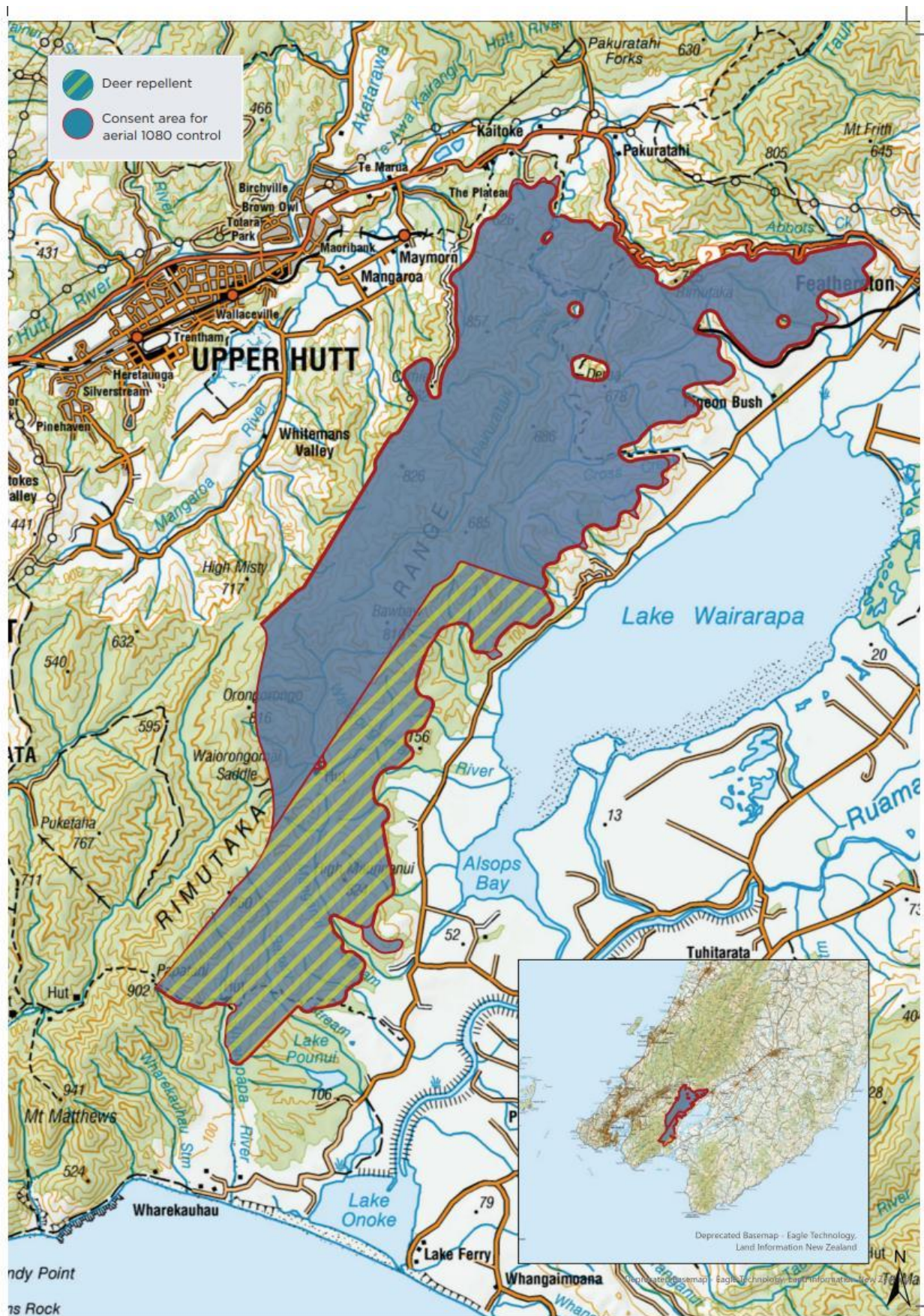
Observe these rules whenever you see warning signs about pesticides. The presence of warning signs indicates that pesticide residues may be present in baits or animals.

When signs are removed, this means you can resume normal activities in the area. Please report suspected

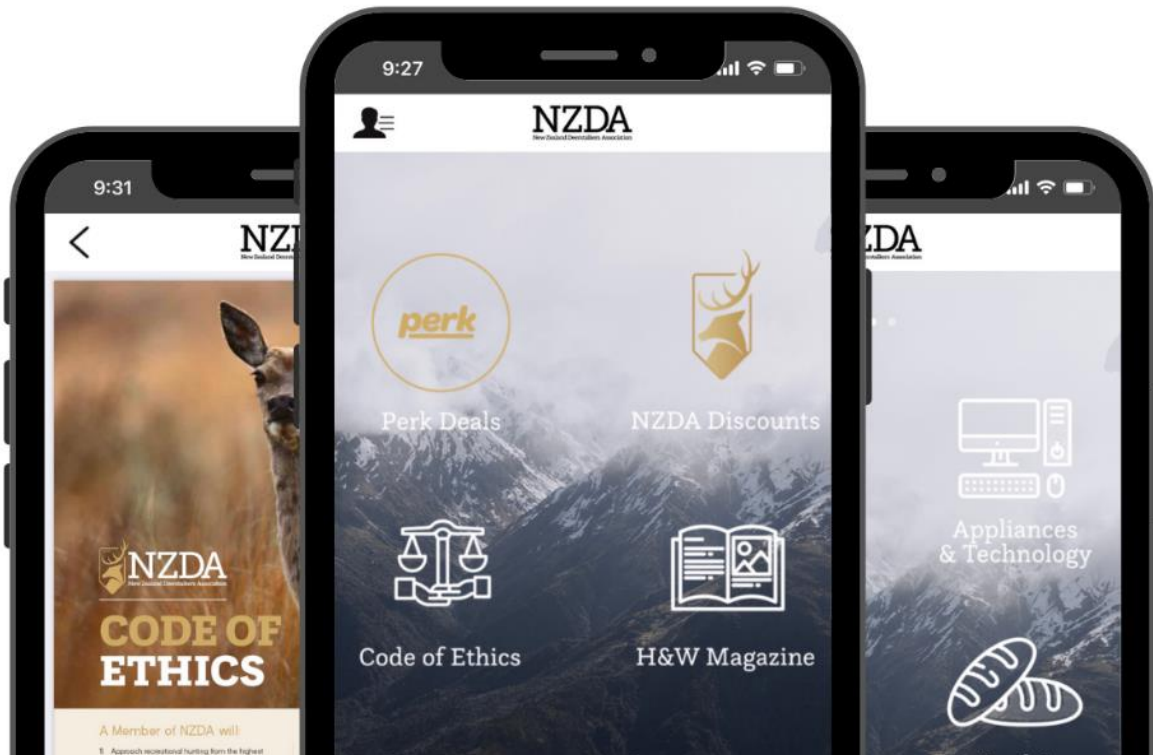

## THE WINCHCOMBE RIDGE AND SOUTHERN TARARUA MAIN RANGE

Two GWBN teams took to the hills last week, to deal with one of the roughest sections of tramping track in Tararua.



Team Winchcombe were based at the Winchcombe bivvy, for a couple of days, then transferred via helicopter to Maungahuka hut. The team was Jim Hepburn, Andrew Bichan, Mike Sheridan and Greg Thurlow. Task was to clear the well overgrown track from Neill to Winchcombe and also install 50 waratahs for marking the alpine route down from Hector to the bivvy. Also install waratahs over Neill. At Maungahuka, the team was to clear the Southern Main Range track to Aokaporangi.

Team Cone spent 2 nights camped on Cone then cut their way down to Neill Forks hut, while the gear was flown. The team was Dave Eaton, Ian Atkinson, Liz Nicholson and Derrick Field. Their task was to clear from Neill to Cone, then work to Neill Forks and cut up to Maungahuka.



The work was long overdue. The new Winchcombe bivvy has been a popular destination, but the track conditions have led to two recent rescues. First couple of days were bit wet, then cleared so both teams made good progress.



Team Winchcombe moved to Hotel Maungahuka while Team Cone cut our way down to Neill Forks hut. A cozy 6 bunk NZFS hut. With plenty of firewood. Last to arrive after 11 hours of cutting windfalls, at Neill Forks hut were Ian and chainsaw guru Dave. On the Southern Main Range, the team found the going hard, thru heavy tussock and flax and constant mud.

At Neill Forks, last days effort was to deal with the Consertina Knob track to Maungahuka. Team Winchcombe also helped by working down from Maungahuka. Liz and Derrick checked out the track from Neill Forks up to Neill. Team Winchcombe flew out a day earlier than Team Cone, who flew out on Wednesday. On the way, waratahs scheduled for the Cone summit were installed also.





Overall, not a lot went wrong. Some long days worked, by all, and all of our track clearing targets met. Getting the Neill route sorted didn't completely happen. Still, it was a long day on the hill. With the needs for helicopter relocations, if the weather hadn't co-operated, the result could have turned out differently. A satisfying result and big effort by the teams to get the tracks cleared in a special part of Tararua. Total effort of the 6 days was a total of 300 hours. All this result was enabled by funding from the Backcountry Trust Aotearoa/New Zealand Trust and also a grant from the Carterton District Council.
