














General Meeting 19 February


FINANCIALS

RANGE & SHOOTING

SEARCH & RESCUE

It has been a busy month with PLB activations. Wairarapa now has the highest rate of beacon activations reported to Rescue Coordination Centre – beating out Wanaka! Not all are emergencies. The Westpac rescue helicopter was recently sent to Tutuwai hut to airlift an injured party. The person wasn't there when the chopper arrived – having recovered enough to walk out on their own!

Public consultation on the rewrite of the Arms Act 1983

From 13 January to 28 February the Ministry of Justice is inviting public submissions to assist us with the Arms Act rewrite. We want to hear your thoughts on what works, what doesn't, and what needs to change in the Act.

This newsletter provides information on how to make a submission, introduces the consultation documents designed to guide your feedback, and outlines resources you can share within your networks to encourage community participation in the consultation process.

Why we are rewriting the Arms Act

We are rewriting the Arms Act to ensure it provides for greater protection of public safety, reflects best regulatory practice, and is fit for purpose. The rewrite is a key part of the commitment made by the Government in the Coalition Agreement between the National Party and the ACT Party to reform New Zealand's firearms laws.

Why your views matter

Every community has a role in shaping the rewrite of the Act. Your submission will help the Government identify where the Act is and isn't working.

Discussion document

We have developed a discussion document to assist with your submission. This document divides the Act into seven key themes and includes a glossary to explain technical terms.

Summary version of the discussion document

We have also developed a summary version of the discussion document that is shorter, less technical and available in English, Arabic, Bengali, Somali, and Urdu. Accessible formats of the summary document will soon be available, and we will provide an update once they are ready.

How to make your submission

You can submit your feedback by:

- using Citizen Space, the Ministry of Justice's online consultation hub
- emailing your submission
- sending it by post.



Going hunting? Get prepared before you go...

Mountain Safety Council

Every year, thousands of Kiwi hunters head into bush, up hills and across ridge lines.



Check out our tips and resources to keep on top of your trip planning and fitness so you can set yourself up for a safe and successful hunt, whatever the season. Without quality training and preparation, hunters can sustain severe injuries with potentially long-lasting consequences.

Severe hunting injuries double during the Roar compared to an average month, making fitness crucial for both your enjoyment and safety. If you're not hunt fit, start your preparation early to ensure you can cover more ground comfortably, stay injury-free and make the most of your hunting trip.

We've developed a free 12-week #ROARfit guide to help you on your fitness journey. If you have less than 12 weeks, don't sweat it – any fitness is better than none. There's no better time to start than today!

12 weeks out: Do the ground work

- Start exercising. A great way to train or maintain your fitness for the Roar is to walk, tramp or go on shorter hunting trips.
- Be consistent. Going regularly is key. Choose an exercise you like, start small and build up slowly, especially if you're out of practice.
- Introduce strength work. As you get fitter, include some weight training in your programme. Again, start small and increase weights gradually.
- Begin planning your hunt. Use the free Plan My Walk app or website to plan your route and build your trip plan.
- Research your hunting route. Once you've decided your route, find out as much information as you can, including hills and other challenging terrain, like ravines.

6 weeks out: Sharpen your focus

- Check your gear. Make sure your gear is in working order. Repair or replace any items now.
- Hit the hills. There's no better way to get prepared, than hunting in the hills on uneven tracks and steep descents.
- Take your pack. A loaded pack on your back will get you #ROARfit. It will also help you decide if you need to cut down on weight.
- Review your progress. Do you need to increase your training? If you're struggling, do you need to reset your goals for the Roar?
- Build a Plan B. Plan your exit routes and decide what your group will do in an emergency, for example if someone gets injured or the weather packs in.
- Check in with your mates. Talk to your hunting party and make sure everyone knows the plan and is getting prepared.

2 weeks out: fine tune

- Check in with your mates, again. Make sure everyone knows the details for the day.
- Share the trip plan. Have an emergency contact and share the trip plan with them. Plan My Walk makes this step easy.
- Rest and recover before the big day. Aim for an early night before you head out. The days can be long so you want to be well rested and focused.

On the day: Stay sharp, know your limits and enjoy the hunt

- Discuss your plan. Before you head out, make sure everyone in the hunting party knows the day's plan.
- Watch the weather. Check the forecast and any weather warnings, and keep an eye on the conditions on the hunt. To get the latest weather updates, sign up to Plan My Walk.
- Pack the essentials. Always take a rain jacket, warm layers, beanie and gloves, emergency shelter, first aid kit and a distress beacon.
- Know your limits. If you're feeling fatigued, either physically or mentally, take a break, reassess your situation and check in with your group. Your top priority is always getting everyone home safe.
- Take care of yourself and each other. Eat, drink and Eat, drink and rest regularly, stick with your group, and make key decisions together.


