

RANGE & SHOOTING

Gladstone range is available for the use of members. Branch members get six free visits a year. Hours for using the Gladstone range for visitors including Deerstalkers 9:30 am to 1:00 pm on Sunday unless you're accompanied by a Gladstone WPSSC member.

Please keep to these times to avoid disappoint as with new police regulations, Range Officers are required on active ranges even for casual shooting.

There is a Precision Rifle match booked on range 6 on the first Sunday of the month so late morning is recommended for that day unless you would like to join in with them which you are more than welcome to do.

Ruahine Deer Management Hunt 2025


The intent of this multi-club hunt is to reduce hind numbers to demonstrate that recreational hunters can be part of effective deer management in the Ruahines.

Proposed timing – **Thursday 13 March to Monday 17 March**, obviously weather dependent so it would pay to allow for an additional day in case we have to bump it to a Friday start.

Fly-in and Fly-out, central/northern Ruahines landing at huts or temporary landing sites on the tops, aim being to spread the hunters out in teams of 2 or 3. Some sites may be removed from those utilized if the Northern 1080 drop occurs prior (this drop is expected soon, pre-feed is about to be dropped).

We will attempt to reduce costs by flying multiple parties from only one or two points. Funding from DoC has also been requested but cannot be counted on. A better indication of costs will become available once numbers and landing sites are confirmed. It is not a trophy hunt as hinds are the target animal, no heads will be carried out by the heli's.

Those taking part will need to provide an expression of interest and a brief honest summary of their hunting experience and current capacity to undertake effective tops hunting. Hunters should forward their interest to the hunt coordinator Gordon George georgeg.gg21@gmail.com. Spots are expected to fill up quickly.

Prepare for a safe and successful roar this year

The NZ Game Animal Council (GAC) is advising hunters across New Zealand to plan for a safe and successful roar this year.


"The March and April roar period is an exciting time of year for many hunters and it's important to prepare for a safe and successful hunt," says GAC Acting General Manager Kaylyn Pinney.

"Coupled with some long weekends, this is the time of year when there are lots of hunters and non-hunters sharing what New Zealand's backcountry has to offer.

"Hunters are one of the biggest users of public conservation land and make significant contributions to conservation through hunting and charitable initiatives.

"If you're exploring the backcountry and cross paths with a hunter, have a chat with them. Let them know where you've been so they know where animals may have been disturbed, and let them know where you're heading, so they can ensure safety all round," says Kaylyn.

"Hunters, if you're sharing a hut with others, have a chat with them about the seven rules of firearms safety and what you're doing to ensure they are upheld. Keep hunting away from huts and tracks."



Follow the 5 P's for preparation

"We're encouraging all hunters to follow the 5 P's for preparation – Plan for the best, Prepare for the worst, Provide your intentions, Positively identify your target, and Pick the right animal.

"Hunters can also incorporate the GAC's free online hunter training platform, Better Hunting, into their preparations. With everything from planning a hunt and ageing stags, to safe river crossing and first aid, there's something for everyone.

"There are many similarities that go into planning a hunt and planning a tramp or camp. Even if you don't hunt, or if you're curious to learn about what goes into hunting, I encourage you to have a look at Better Hunting too," says Kaylyn.

Hunters, remember to make sure you have your hunting permits for public conservation land, access permissions for private land, and have checked the DOC pesticides summary map.

Northern Remutaka: Proposed Aerial 1080 Programme – Toxic Notification

A suitable weather window has been identified to deliver the next phase of the Northern Remutaka aerial pest control operation. The toxic application will be undertaken on **Saturday 22nd February** (weather permitting).

EcoFX is undertaking this work on behalf of Ospri. The operation is being carried out as part of the TBfree Programme that aims to manage and eventually eradicate bovine tuberculosis (TB) from New Zealand's farmed cattle and deer and wild animal populations.

Pesticide to be used: Sodium Fluoroacetate (1080).

Warning signs will be put in place. A reminder to please check for signage if you are in the area. And;

- **DO NOT TOUCH** poison bait
- WATCH children at all times
- **DO NOT EAT** animals from this area or within the buffer zone outside the treatment boundary. The standard buffer zone is 2km for deer and pigs, 200m for rabbits, and 1km for possums.
- Poison bait or carcasses are DEADLY to DOGS


Observe these rules whenever you see warning signs about pesticides. The presence of warning signs indicates pesticide residues may be present in baits or animals. Risks will exist until signage is taken down. Poisoning can occur through eating baits or poisoned animals, and dogs are particularly susceptible to 1080 until poisoned carcasses have disintegrated. This takes approximately four to eight months, but can be longer, and depends on monitoring results. When signs are removed, this means you can resume normal activities in the area. Please report suspected vandalism or unauthorised removal of signs.
