



## **RANGE & SHOOTING**

Gladstone range is available for the use of members. Branch members get six free visits a year. Hours for using the Gladstone range for visitors including Deerstalkers 9:30 am to 1:00 pm on Sunday and Wednesday afternoon from 2 pm unless you're accompanied by a Gladstone WPSSC member.

Please keep to these times to avoid disappoint as with new police regulations, Range Officers are required on active ranges even for casual shooting.

There is a Precision Rifle match booked on range 6 on the first Sunday of the month so late morning is recommended for that day unless you would like to join in with them which you are more than welcome to do.

# Major changes to firearms law announced

The Government has announced the repeal and replacement of the Arms Act, the legislation at the heart of New Zealand's firearms laws.

This is a significant development for everyone in the hunting community.

The new Act is intended to create a law that is more fit-for-purpose, and that improves public safety by keeping firearms out of the hands of criminals while making compliance easier for responsible licensed firearms owners.

Hunters need reasonable access to firearms to participate safely and responsibly in their sport. The same is true for those undertaking game animal management, farming, food gathering and pest control – firearms are an essential tool that enables them to effectively manage animals, protect livelihoods, and support conservation outcomes.

There are a number of areas where significant changes are proposed, including around storage flexibility, a new 'red flag' system, updated penalties and new offences, endorsement extensions for pest controllers and a new firearms regulator separated from Police. A number of these represent very meaningful changes for hunters and others who participate in the safe and lawful recreational or professional use of firearms.

## What happens next?

The detail now needs to be drafted into legislation. Once drafted, this legislation will be introduced to Parliament. After its first reading, the Bill will go to a select committee. This is when the public gets to have its say, with the Government committing to a full select committee process and consultation.

That select committee process will be the key opportunity for hunters and firearm users to provide feedback on specific aspects of the draft legislation and help shape the final law.

# Licensing demand creating delays

Licence applications have risen sharply, and processing times are longer than usual. This surge stems from the introduction of the 10-year licence. Many were issued around the same time, meaning large numbers are now expiring together.

In 2023/24 we issued 19,672 licences. Last year that rose to 25,119, a 27% increase. This year demand is tracking toward 30,000-35,000 applications. While our team is working hard, current resourcing cannot fully absorb this volume without affecting timeframes.

We are exploring ways to smooth out these high-demand peaks in the system. In the meantime, applying early helps both you and us. If you apply for your renewal prior to the expiry date, you can continue to possess and use firearms and ammunition legally, irrespective of how long the renewal process takes.

Retailers can use our online <u>'licence checker'</u> tool to confirm the current status of your firearms licence so you can continue to purchase firearms or ammunition.

Additionally, applications submitted before a licence expires cost \$126.50 and remain valid for 10 years, while expired-licence applications cost \$241.50 and are valid for five.




